*Oyster
Aquaculture
in Texas?*



Dr. John Scarpa – Associate Professor of Aquaculture

Texas has a natural oyster fishery that has varied in annual production from 1.59 to 6.81 million pounds over the past two decades. However, the general trend is declining and the future uncertain. Oyster aquaculture accounts for approximately 96% of all oysters produced globally for human consumption.

Currently, Texas is the only U.S. coastal state that has no regulatory policy for commercial oyster aquaculture. The presentation will review oyster aquaculture and what is known, or perceived, as a user conflict, such as interfering with boating traffic, by the general public.

This will be followed by an open discussion for those attending regarding what they perceive as a potential user conflict and if there are solutions to allow off-bottom oyster culture that would be agreeable to all. *Note: The photo above is of an oyster mariculture facility in Chesapeake Bay, NOT Texas.*
